Notes from the presentation from LGISWA.

Representing LGISWA:

• Howard King, Board Chair

• Jonathan Seth, Chief Executive Officer

Howard King outlined the emergence of LGISWA and the growth of the Scheme. The Scheme came into being based on the risks in the north. Modelling has been done on catastrophic events.

Adequacy of reserves – need to be careful on buying limits of cover and handling of reserves.

Distributions have begun with members receiving \$27m overall.

The appearance of cheaper models and brokers has emerged. Howard King is concerned about the sustainability of lower priced brokers. LGISWA are competitive with build in cover unique to Local

Government. Some of the surplus is used to price down the premiums.

Members would like to see products based on collective needs – eg Workers Compensation.

LGISWA wary of pursuing collective agreements however there are grounds for a WARCA product.

LGISWA happy to do work on comparative analysis from other brokers/schemes if Members request

it.

Purpose

The purpose of the report is twofold, firstly to outline the position of WARCA in relation to the review of the Local Government Act 1995 and secondly to outline a policy position which could be adopted in terms of the election platform. Whilst legislative reform is considered to be whole of industry, the priority areas have been identified for consideration should a complete review of the Act not be undertaken.

Whilst WARCA should not be duplicating the work of WALGA, there is an opportunity to assist in the review process and WALGA have welcomed input from WARCA on this matter.

Background

WALGA has the following position in relation to the Local Government Act 1995 –

The Local Government Act 1995 was drafted over 20 years ago and while most aspects of governance and administration of the sector remain consistent, there have been dramatic changes in technology since 1995 and some parts of the Act are now outdated. Further, there have been many amendments to the Act since its inception, some of which have added layers of complexity to the original legislative intent.

Reviewing the Local Government Act would provide the opportunity for the Local Government Act to be contextually relevant to 21st Century technology. Further, there would be opportunities for Local Government compliance costs to be reduced resulting in greater efficiencies, the benefits of which would be realised by residents and ratepayers.

The intent of WARCA is not to duplicate the work or position that WALGA has however there are a number of priority areas that have been identified within the Act that should be addressed as a priority. To date the following matters have been raised through WARCA meetings and are on the emerging/contentious issues register:

Budget Implications

Involvement of WARCA in any review or prioritisation would be in terms of officer time and not a direct cost to WARCA.

Options

Based on the position taken by WARCA there are a number of options which range from a simple advocacy role through to active involvement through to the development of a detailed discussion paper identifying the priority areas for reform.

There have been a significant number of papers written in recent times outlining the status of local government legislation across Australia with one of the most recent being a paper by Graham Sansom Pty Ltd in relation to the Local Government Act Review in Victoria which outlines the experience and ideas from other jurisdictions. This paper provides a good summary of the issues across each of the State and the current situation.

There are two other documents attached to the report which are:

- 1) A copy of a presentation by King and Company Solicitors in relation to the introduction of the Local Government Act 2009 in Queensland; and
- 2) Modernising Local Government which was prepared by the Local Government and Shires Association of NSW.

Both of these papers along with the paper prepared by Graham Sansom would provide sufficient detail to prepare a more comprehensive position by WARCA.

Conclusion

In supporting a new or heavily amended Act WARCA should write in an overview of what we are trying to achieve as a basis for a terms of reference.

This should include:

- Developing an enabling, principle based Act that is more streamlined than currently and simplifies the regulatory aspects
- Rather than a rewrite create one that refocuses and is less prescriptive than currently-
- An Act that strengthens the importance of IP and R which will in turn bring more accountability through what in essence would be a contract with the community. This will also lead to more autonomy for the Council, a lesser role for the State and its DLG
- A closer and more formal link between State, Regional and Council Strategic plans

Recommendation

That WARCA:

- 1) Incorporate a review/rewrite of the Local Government Act 1995 as one of the matters for WARCA Election Platform;
- 2) Support the development of a comprehensive discussion paper and position statement in relation to the review of the Local Government Act 1995.

6. WARCA MEMBERSHIP

The membership of WARCA is currently comprised of the following Councils:

- Albany
- Bunbury
- Greater Geraldton
- Kalgoorlie
- Karratha
- Broome
- Port Hedland

At the last WARCA Board meeting, discussion was had in relation to admitting further local governments to align WARCA's membership with the State Planning Strategy 2050's definition of Regional Centres, which includes the following local governments:

- Kununurra
- Carnaryon
- Mandurah
- Busselton

While there seems to be merit in aligning WARCA's membership with the Regional Centres defined in the State Planning Strategy, there does not appear to be any clear rational or evaluation criteria used to determine what is, or isn't, a Regional Centre.

In 2014 the University of Western Australia's School of Earth and Environment published a paper, at the request of WARCA, titled "Regional Capitals in the Western Australian Settlement Hierarchy Identifying Regional Capitals". This paper (attached) identified:

- A Regional Capital is a territorial unit located within a regionally defined boundary that is considered to be both large enough to constitute a viable urban settlement and have significant growth potential.
- Regional Capitals are functional economic regions as opposed to Administrative/Political regions.
- Functional economic regions are made up of nodes and other territorial units to which they
 are connected. Functional economic regions are characterised by commuting patterns which
 are delineated in relation to urban centres and capture local interplay between the supply of
 labour and demand for labour.
- Functional economic regions are defined using hierarchical aggregation techniques that have been employed by the Centre for Full Employment and Equity (CofFEE).
- The following local governments meet the criteria to be classified as Regional Capitals because they are functional economic regions with viable urban centres in terms of their

populations size and persons employed, and because they have the highest growth potential relative to overall patterns of population and employment growth across Western Australia:

- Albany
- Bunbury
- Greater Geraldton
- Kalgoorlie
- Karratha
- Broome
- Port Hedland
- Northam
- Busselton
- Esperance
- The evidence suggests that there is a distinct and widening gap between Regional Capitals and the remainder of regional Western Australia.

Extending the membership of WARCA to align with the State Planning Strategy may provide political benefit, but it could also be detrimental by shifting WARCA's focus into areas that are not demonstrating (or likely to demonstrate) strong growth, or are not distinct functional economic regions in their own right.

Interestingly, while the University of Western Australia's research identifies Northam and Esperance as Regional Capitals, they are not identified in the State Planning Strategy as Regional Centres.

Should the Board extend membership the issue of fees for these new members would need to be resolved. Presently members are paying fee contributions of \$44,934 as follows:

As can be seen from the above table, a large proportion of this fee relates to the UWA research contribution. This contribution was a result of an agreement between UWA and the original members of WARCA, and for this reason it would be inappropriate to pass the fee on to new members. Accordingly, it is proposed that fees for new members be as follows:

Alternately, the Board may wish to provide an introductory discount, or not require membership of Regional Capitals Australia (RCA).

7. UWA RESEARCH CONTRIBUTION AND AGREEMENT

Please find attached a copy of the 2011 Cooperation Agreement between the University of Western Australia and the members of WARCA, namely the City of Albany, the Shire of Broome, the City of Bunbury, the City of Greater Geraldton, the City of Kalgoorlie-Boulder, the Town of Port Hedland and the City of Karratha.

The key outcomes and deliverables of the agreement include:

The Partnership would aim to achieve:

An increase in research activity on the needs and future development of Western Australia's regional cities;

Strategic guidance and advice to Alliance Members; and

An increase in Undergraduate and Postgraduate students engaged in research on Western Australia's regional cities.

The Partnership would deliver:

A minimum of two (2) short *Regional City Bulletins* per year. These would be a short (ca 10 page) briefing paper on various aspects of the research programme (as agreed by the Research Management Committee);

One (1) major report per year that incorporates all member cities (on a topic agreed to by the Research Management Committee);

Two (2) presentations per year to the Alliance updating the research progress;

A minimum of one (1) ARC Linkage research funding bid biannually that incorporates all member cities (negotiated through the Research Management Committee);

A minimum of two (2) papers submitted to refereed journals per year; and

A minimum of four (4) PhD students working on topics related to the regional cities within three (3) years.

The total cost of the agreement is as follows:

The agreement is currently in its fourth year with a contribution of \$198, 639 to be paid in this current financial year and a final payment of \$147,001 next financial year.

The agreement provides specific deliverables in the form of reports, meetings and ongoing research and key areas of focus are detailed in appendix 1. To date there has been no formal review of the progress of the research or the applicability of ongoing research.

Recent concerns raised by WARCA members in relation to UWA research include:

- 1. The nature of the reports are too academic for WARCA members to comprehend;
- 2. The reports, while academically sound, do not help WARCA members form economic development strategies based on the findings; and
- 3. The state governments RCDP2 process is

Given the above concerns and the significant investment of WARCA, it would be an appropriate time to review the agreement, with a view to bringing it to an end or negotiating a change of research focus.

Recommendation

That the Board receive and consider the Treasurer's report dated 27th July 2016 in relation to the Cooperation Agreement with the University of Western Australia and resolve:

1. To form a working group comprised to review the Cooperation Agreement with the University of Western Australia and negotiate either a change in scope or an early

 - o Concerns around the importance of Round 2 funding

12. MEETING WITH MINISTER TONY SIMPSON

Notes from meeting with Minister Tony Simpson:

Some points raised by Members with Minister response:

- Recognition of WARCA as a key stakeholder in Govt/Department discussions
- Is there an appetite for the possibility of giving a rating of the LG's across the state?
 Compliance through the LG Act?
 - Acknowledges a small LG would find it difficult to comply with the current LG Act which is written for larger LG's
- Rates exemptions (Kenn Donohoe highlighted that in Broome alone there are 700 rate exempt properties):
 - Minister is concerned with current status. He is trying to get the balance right between the NFP's and Churches. He would like to take it to a COAG meeting through ALGA.
 - Minister with take the issue on board stating that the NFP's positions need to be clarified.
- Concerns with the Department of Housing
 - Minister said this needs to be looked at from a national perspective.
- The LG Act is ageing the Act is more prescriptive than the Eastern States equivalents.
 What is the appetite for review?
 - Minister is reluctant to review because he has a thin majority. The review of the entire Act would be a huge job and it would struggle to get some parts through.
 There may be consideration taken if they were to focus on different sections of the Act and drive through the changes.
 - The Minister called for WARCA to drive the process. Bring the sector on board and open up the discussion. Identify the sections for change. Minister may be able to make additions which bring the Act up to date.
- WALGA somewhat compromised on various issues. UWA research reflects the significant impact on the WA economy.
 - Minister suggested to pick the fights you can win.
- Rating requirements to get approval
- Autonomy for LG's
- Bigger LG's have the capacity to do these rating reviews
 - The Government will always make the law for the lowest common denominator.
- Seeks guidance on collaborative arrangements with neighbours. How can the Department work with the RC's and form trust?
 - The reform process is 'dead and buried'
- Members would like to see models of collaboration regional subsidiaries
- WARCA will prepare some submission papers. Will be available in October.

The Minister left the meeting at 3.45pm

Meeting Round up:

WARCA members agreed with the Minister not to call for a complete re-write of the LG Act but to identify what areas to identify and set as a priority review.

Concerns with gaining legal advice on this process.

WARCA is a lobby group and not to get legal advice. All participants need to be on board.

Working group to be formed to review this point.

The Chair Peter Long thanked Mayor Kelly Howlett for her contribution to the Alliance and wished her well for her future.

There being no further business, the meeting was closed at 3.49pm.
